SITUATION OVERVIEW

Insecurity in Haiti continues to spiral with constant gang attacks over the past two months. Despite tight security restrictions and challenges, IOM and its partners continued delivering vital humanitarian assistance and addressing emerging needs in Haiti.

While security related displacements have made headlines, heavy rains have flooded the most impoverished neighborhoods of the capital, limiting health, deteriorating hygiene conditions and aggravating diseases risks.

Over the past two months, more than 30,000 Haitian nationals were forcibly returned to Haiti, 150% more than the first two months of the year. Therefore, IOM reinforced the assistance to returned Haitian nationals upon arrival in the north and at the border.
