

## OVERVIEW

In December 2022, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) in Haiti identified the repatriations of 39,359 migrants including 95 per cent arriving by land, 3 by air and 2 by sea. In December 2022, the vast majority of migrants were repatriated by the Dominican Republic, especially through the cross-border points of Ouanaminthe and Belladère.

IOM provided reception and post-arrival assistance, based on vulnerability criteria, to 3,357 migrants, which represents 28 per cent of the total of repatriated migrants. Assistance was mostly provided to migrants arriving by air and sea at Port-au-Prince and Cap Haitien where respectively, 92 and 100 per cent of repatriated migrants were assisted. In contrast, due to lack of sufficient resources, assistance to repatriated migrants arriving by land was lower : 61 per cent of repatriated migrants were assisted at Malpasse, 32 at Ouanaminthe and 5 at Belladère.

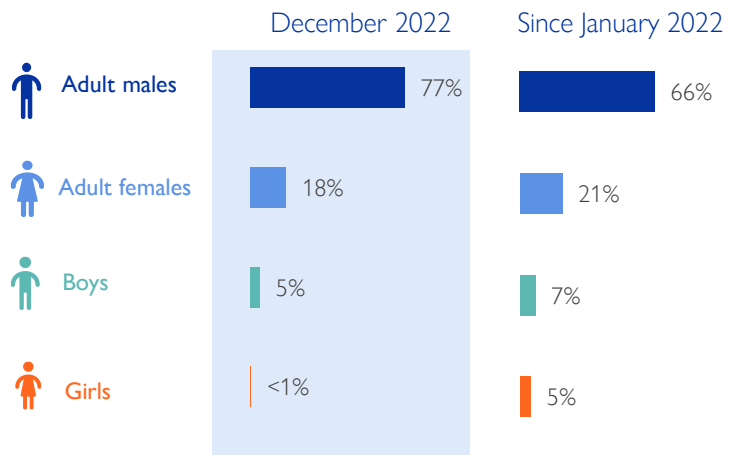

## GENDER AND AGE DISAGGREGATION OF REPATRIATED MIGRANTS

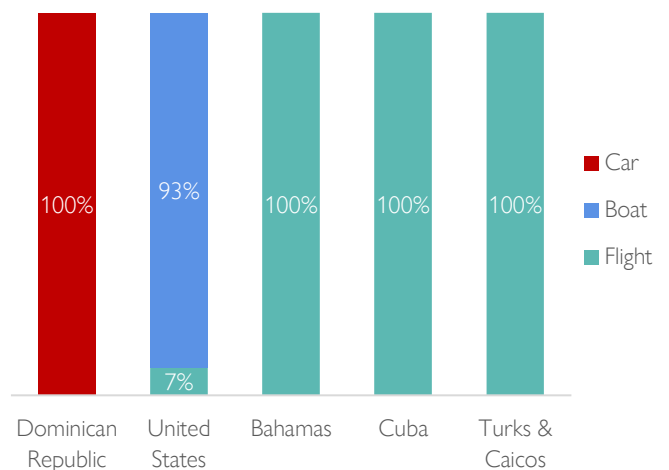

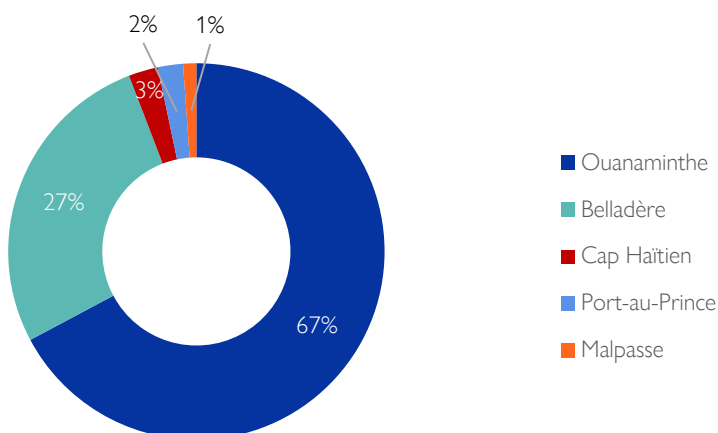

## REPATRIATING COUNTRIES AND MODE OF ARRIVAL IN DECEMBER 2022

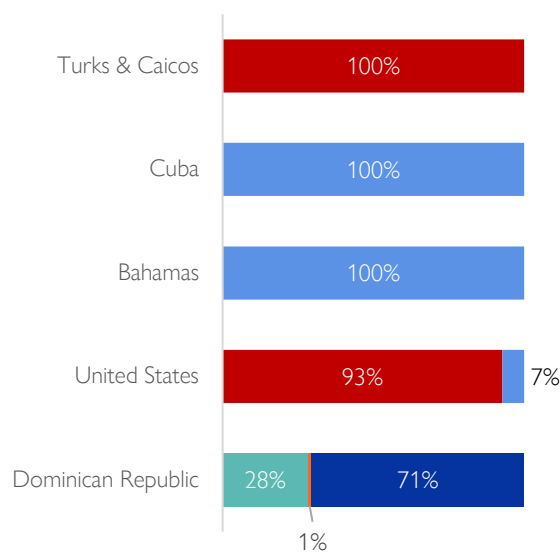


<sup>1</sup> **Arrival by Land** : IOM started the monitoring of land arrivals in November 2022 at key cross-border points with the Dominican Republic (Ouanaminthe, Belladère and Malpasse). The reported figures in December 2022 do not represent the total number of migrants repatriated from the Dominican Republic during this month as IOM is not present at the official cross-border point of Ans-a-Pitres and other many unofficial cross-border points. ## REPATRIATING COUNTRY BY ARRIVAL LOCATION

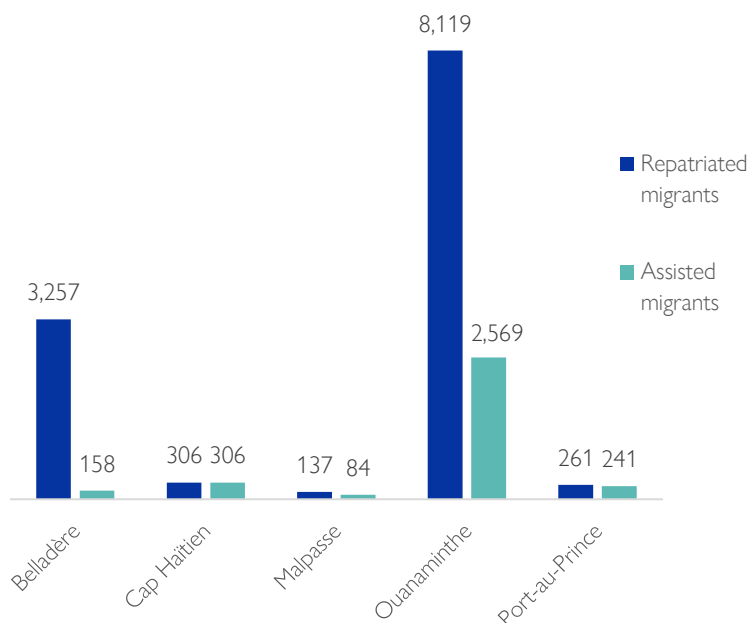


## IOM ASSISTANCE

Many repatriated migrants, which include unaccompanied and separated children as well as pregnant and nursing women, arrive to Haiti in highly vulnerable situations with few if any resources. They are often in immediate need of humanitarian assistance, having faced a series of health and protection concerns during their journeys. IOM offers the following on-site services upon arrival :

- Food and beverage during the registration process
- Unconditional and multipurpose cash assistance (except migrants from the Dominican Republic)
- Hygiene kits for everyone, including dignity items for women and girls and specific kits for babies (Hygiene kits are not delivered to every migrants repatriated from the Dominican Republic; only to the most vulnerable)
- First aid and referral to medical assistance if needed
- Psychosocial support and counseling services provided by trained IOM psychologists
- Support family reunification for unaccompanied / separated children with the Institute for Social Welfare and Research (IBESR)
- Phones available to call friends and relatives
- Protection screening by trained staff to identify vulnerable migrants and referrals to special services
